Reference online magazine and newspaper articles differently than web sites.

Last Name, First Name and Initial(s) of author [followed by first name, initial(s), and last name of other author(s), if any].

Year. Title of article. Title of Newspaper or Magazine. [Online]. Available: <URL> Accessed: Date.

Note:

- 1. Use the original publication date rather than the date you accessed the article or the date of the web site.
- 2. The year of publication is used as the date, but include the month and day of publication (if available) after the title of the magazine or newspaper. A comma separates the publication from the month and day.
- 3. Include page numbers or section number. These appear after the month and day. A colon separates month and day from the page or section number.
- 4. After the title of the magazine, newspaper, or distributor, type [Online]
- 5. If there is no author of the article, you can use the name of the newspaper as the author. In rare cases, you might use anonymous as the author.
